A little Shanghai cricket history

Historical archives logged the first game played in Shanghai somewhere in Hongkou on April 22, 1858.

In 1863, the first true cricket ground was bought by the Shanghai Recreation Fund from the Horse Racing Club. The ground was located at a racetrack, which is now People's Square.

The inter-port match between Hong Kong Cricket Club and Shanghai Cricket Club began in 1866 as a series of home and away fixtures that continued up until 1948, just prior to the People's Liberation Army takeover of Shanghai.

With some help from the Hong Kong Cricket Club and Melbourne Cricket Club and efforts from cricketers in Shanghai, the Shanghai Cricket Club was reestablished in 1994. Since then, the game of cricket in the city has gone from strength to strength, more organized and respected, new players from around the world joining in for the love of the game, the love for the great outdoors and the oval they stand in.
